15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

a. Vision/Plan for Multidisciplinary Transformation WMO Arts & Science College, affiliated with the University of Calicut, aims to be a holistic multidisciplinary institution. It offers UG and PG programs in Science, Mathematics, Languages, Humanities, and Commerce. In all UG programs, students can choose open courses from other departments. Certificate courses are also designed to include technology in teaching, promoting critical thinking, creativity, and decision-making. b. Integration of Humanities and Science with STEM The college runs various activities to connect humanities and science with STEM, including: Mathematical Problem Contest Star Watching Programs Science Talks on advanced topics Cultural and literary programs Commerce and Humanities activities Audit courses on Human Rights, Intellectual Property Rights, Environmental Science, and Disaster Management Certificate courses Students from any discipline can join these activities and courses. c. Flexible and Innovative Curriculum The college's curricula include projects, community engagement, environmental education, and multidisciplinary learning. The MSW program focuses on community projects, and NCC and NSS are involved in various extension activities. Multidisciplinary education is part of the UG curriculum, with open courses available for students to choose from other disciplines. Courses like 'Non-Conventional Energy Sources' and 'Environmental Chemistry' address environmental issues, while 'Newspaper Journalism' focuses on value-based education. There are also audit courses and ability enhancement programs for postgraduate students. d. Institutional Plan for Flexible Curriculum WMO Arts & Science College is affiliated with the University of Calicut, and the curriculum is set by the University Board of Studies. As a result, the college does not have the flexibility to create a fully multidisciplinary curriculum that allows for multiple entries and exits during undergraduate education. e. Multidisciplinary Research Endeavors In

2019, WMO Arts & Science College was selected for the UGC's STRIDE project, which includes 18 colleges across India. This involvement has advanced the college's research activities and encouraged academic inquiry among faculty and students. The research project focuses on 'Adaptive Speech Recognition for Speech Defects in the Malayalam Language' and involves collaboration among the Electronics, Malayalam, and Computer Science departments. Dr. Nobert Thomas Pallath from the Department of Electronics is the principal investigator. f. Good Practices to Promote Multidisciplinary Approach The college celebrates various national and international days related to science, mathematics, engineering, humanities, languages, and culture, allowing all students to participate. All departments offer certificate and value-added courses open to students from any field. Faculty discussions are held to plan and implement outcome-based education, including meetings about the NEP.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

WMO Arts and Science College is an aided institution affiliated with the University of Calicut, which sets the curriculum and policies alongside the government. As a result, the college has limited flexibility in implementing key features of the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC), such as allowing multiple entries and exits during a program. However, students are encouraged to participate in various short-term and online courses offered through NPTEL and other institutions. The college has also initiated agreements (MOUs) with nearby educational institutions for collaborative efforts in both curricular and extracurricular activities. Faculty members are encouraged to create study materials and audio/video lessons, which are shared through the college's LMS platform, WMO E-Space. Additionally, departments offer certificate courses that any student can register for and complete to receive a certificate

17.Skill development:

The college offers various courses and programs aimed at developing students' skills. 18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

a) The college has developed strategies to integrate the Indian Knowledge System, including teaching in Indian languages and culture, into the curriculum through both offline and online courses. Additionally, the institution plans to train faculty to deliver lessons in a bilingual format (English and the local vernacular). Staff discussions on various aspects of the NEP have been organized. According to Calicut University regulations, students must take exams in English, except for language courses. As an affiliated college of the University of Calicut, the college follows all university rules. Faculty members utilize both Malayalam and English to effectively communicate knowledge to students. b) The college offers 11 undergraduate programs, each providing second language courses in Indian languages such as Malayalam and Hindi, allowing students to choose either one. In seven specific UG programs—BSc Physics, BSc Mathematics, BSc Chemistry, BA Arabic, BA Economics, BA Mass Communication, and BA English—students are required to complete four courses in either Hindi or Malayalam during the first four semesters. For BSc Electronics, BCA, BCom Cooperation, and BCom Computer Application, students must complete two courses in either Hindi or Malayalam during the first two semesters. c) The institution makes efforts to preserve and promote the following: i. Indian languages (such as Sanskrit, Pali, Prakrit, and other classical, tribal, and endangered languages), ii. Indian ancient traditional knowledge, iii. Indian arts, and iv. Indian culture and traditions. The college celebrates traditional cultural festivals like ONAM and Chingapiravi, and it observes World Mother Tongue Day every year. Programs featuring traditional dance forms such as Kathakali and Gadhika are also conducted at the college.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Here are the initiatives taken by the college to shift its curriculum towards Outcome-Based Education (OBE) and the efforts made to incorporate OBE into teaching and learning practices: The college holds discussion meetings for faculty members in Science, Arts & Humanities, and Commerce to implement ideas from the NEP. As a result, all departments have developed their course and program outcomes. At the start of each semester, a detailed semester plan is created for each course, outlining the objectives, prerequisites, and expected outcomes. Periodic checks are conducted to ensure that the semester plan is being followed. Effective evaluation methods are used to assess whether the expected outcomes are being achieved. As a best practice, the college displays the course and program outcomes for all programs on its website.

20.Distance education/online education:

The college utilizes a Learning Management System (LMS) based on the Moodle platform to facilitate online education. Additionally, it employs campus automation software called Campex, which was developed through the incubation center. During the COVID-19 pandemic, classes were conducted using various online platforms, including Moodle, Google Classroom, and Teachmint. Online meeting software such as Google Meet and Zoom were also encouraged for teaching purposes. In the post-COVID era, faculty members have adopted a hybrid approach, combining both offline and online teaching methods. As a best practice, the college is progressively transitioning to offer all courses in a blended format through the LMS. Furthermore, our college serves as a center for distance education under the University of Calicut, providing opportunities for students who face barriers to regular higher education due to financial, familial, or social challenges. These students can pursue their undergraduate and postgraduate degrees through the University of Calicut. The college supplies study materials and organizes contact classes as per university guidelines, and this facility has benefited many students in our district in their pursuit of education.

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

WMO Arts and Science College, Muttill, affiliated with the University of Calicut, follows the university's syllabus and academic calendar. Each department tailors its curriculum delivery and activities within this framework, with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) developing an academic master plan at the start of each year. Faculty prepare semester plans that outline objectives, teaching methods, evaluations, and expected outcomes.

A timetable is set before classes start, employing a variety of student-centered methods to meet diverse learning needs. Departments enrich learning with simulations, group discussions, exhibitions, projects, seminars, and problem-solving activities. Practical exposure is gained through industrial visits, interactions with scholars, and contributions to department publications. Bridge courses ensure foundational knowledge for each semester.

Support programs, including government-funded SSP and remedial classes, assist slow learners, while advanced learners benefit from career-oriented programs and seminars. Departments feature smart classrooms for ICT-based teaching, campus-wide Wi-Fi, a computer lab, and labs for Physics, Electronics, and Chemistry. The library offers a broad selection of books and journals.

The college promotes gender equality, environmental sustainability, and creative skill development. The Women's Cell organizes programs on rights and self-reliance. Students participate in NCC, NSS, and clubs such as Bhoomithra Sena, the Entrepreneurship Club, Quiz Club, Readers and Writers Forum, and Singing Nest.

The Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) is a key part of the college's assessment strategy, contributing 20% of total course marks, as per university policy. Conducted within the university's academic calendar, CIE offers ongoing assessment through written tests, seminars, assignments, and classroom participation. Each course includes at least two internal exams, with standardized question papers, ensuring consistency and alignment with university standards. Marks are transparently shared with students and uploaded to the university's portal for accessible records.

For undergraduate projects and postgraduate dissertations, the college conducts Viva Voce exams with external examiners appointed by the university, providing objective evaluation of students' research and comprehension. Marks are compiled based on university-set criteria, upholding high academic standards.

Through structured, transparent evaluations and adherence to university protocols, WMO Arts and Science College promotes academic quality, equipping students with essential knowledge and skills for academic success.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The institute employs a range of student-centered teaching methods, focusing on experiential, participative, and problem-solving approaches to enhance learning outcomes. Faculty design, evaluate, and refine course content to promote active and effective learning, adapting methods by program and course to encourage self-assessment. Advanced facilities such as ICT-enabled classrooms, a language lab, discussion rooms, and skill development spaces create an interactive learning environment that engages students.

Administrative tools like Koha and Campex streamline library and administrative processes, while various activities organized by the college union and departments support holistic student growth and community engagement.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The institute follows a dual assessment system, with 20% weightage for Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and 80% for the External End Semester Examination (ESE). Both CIA and ESE employ an indirect grading system. The University conducts the summative ESE, awarding final grades after external evaluation. A transparent, efficient mechanism governs the CIA process, aligned with the University's framework and overseen by a college-level committee and coordinator.

For theory courses, test scores account for 40% of internal assessment, while assignments, seminars, and class participation

(based on attendance) contribute 20% each. Practical courses allocate 60% to record-keeping and 40% to lab participation. Projects are evaluated on content quality, presentation, conclusion, and research aptitude, while seminars are graded on structure, content, presentation, and interactivity. Students receive additional tests and assignments to help them reach optimal performance.

To maintain transparency, internal assessment scores are displayed on the department notice board, and students review a draft of the internal marks uploaded to the University portal, signing for confirmation. All assessment records are archived in the relevant departments, and students can review their work, seek clarification, and understand their performance evaluation.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

The college has a transparent, decentralized system to handle grievances related to internal assessments, with a two-level approach at the department and college levels. This structure ensures that student concerns are addressed effectively at the grassroots.

At the department level, a grievance committee is chaired by the Head of the Department, with a course teacher, a senior faculty member, and the Association Secretary (an elected student representative) as members. This team addresses complaints initially, providing a quick resolution path. If an issue remains unresolved, students can escalate their concerns to the college-level committee.

The College-Level Committee is chaired by the Principal and includes the student adviser, two senior teachers, two staff council members (one elected), and the College Union Chairperson as the student representative. This committee handles unresolved grievances, ensuring fairness and impartiality in reviewing internal assessment grades.

If students are still unsatisfied with the outcome at the college level, they have the option to appeal to the University Level Grievance Redressal Committee. Academic records, maintained by the course teacher for each student, are available to the grievance redressal committees as needed, ensuring transparency and accountability in the grievance process.

The college has a structured approach to communicate Programme Outcomes (PO) and Course Outcomes (CO) to students and faculty. Unit tests are administered at the end of each unit to evaluate students' competency as required by the course. Additionally, assignments, seminars, role plays, debates, and other student-centered methods are meticulously designed to gauge the level of attainment for defined outcomes.

The attainment of program outcomes is measured using several metrics: the pass percentage of a program offers insight into the achievement of specified outcomes; student enrollment in higher studies, both domestically and internationally, indicates the effectiveness of the curriculum; and the placement rate in companies and industries reflects students' readiness for the workforce. Furthermore, the number of students who become self-employed or entrepreneurs serves as an additional measure. Student satisfaction surveys conducted by the IQAC further enhance the assessment process, providing valuable feedback for continuous improvement.

WMO Arts and Science College, Muttill, is located on a 14-acre environmentally-friendly campus designed for around 2,000 students. The college provides comprehensive facilities that support educational, athletic, and recreational activities, including:

- 51 Classrooms with white/green boards, Wi-Fi, LCD projectors,

LED TVs, and interactive boards for 11 UG and 8 PG programs.

- Seven Laboratories: Electronics, Physics, Chemistry, Media, and three Computer Labs for hands-on learning.
- An Audiovisual Studio and an e-Content Development Centre to facilitate multimedia learning.
- Two Browsing Centers and a Language Laboratory enhancing language skills and research capabilities.
- Three Seminar Halls equipped with modern ICT capabilities for presentations.
- A well-equipped Library (600 sq. m) featuring stacks, reference areas, and online resources such as INFLIBINET-N LIST, e-journals, e-books, and e-magazines, with remote access facilities.
- Fully Wi-Fi Enabled campus with dual leased lines (BSNL 300 MBPS and Malanad 75 MBPS).
- CCTV Surveillance and a Centralized Announcement System connecting all academic blocks.
- Divyangjan-Friendly Facilities, including separate toilets for boys and girls with a napkin vending machine and incinerator.
- A Learning Management System (Moodle) for academic support, plus access to NPTEL and other online courses.
- Additional facilities include a Counseling Room, Sick Room, Student Well-being Centre, and a Health Gymnasium.
- Separate Parking Facilities, Hostels for Boys and Girls, a Canteen, a Bookstore, Prayer Rooms, and Staff Quarters.
- Infrastructure features ramps for accessibility, an Auto Bell System, a Generator (125 KVA), Rainwater Harvesting, and PABX for communication.

WMO Arts and Science College offers a comprehensive range of outdoor sports facilities, including football, volleyball, shuttle badminton, and cricket. The college features an international standard cricket pitch developed with the Kerala Cricket Association. Football and volleyball teams boast impressive records at the university level. Facilities include a 3484-square-meter

football field, a 162-square-meter volleyball court, three standard-size shuttle courts, and a 400-meter athletic track, alongside a well-equipped gymnasium.

Infrastructure details include:

- 400-meter track with a multipurpose playing area
- Sports hostel for men, constructed with UGC support
- Two standard-size volleyball courts
- One standard-size football field
- One standard-size cricket field with a turf pitch

Indoor facilities comprise a well-maintained Yoga and Staff Recreation Centre, with separate centers for girls and boys equipped with chess boards and caroms. The fitness center spans 603 square feet.

The Ibn Khaldun Library serves as the central library and learning resource center of the college, featuring a fully automated system and extensive broadband and Wi-Fi access. Spanning 6,458 square feet, it provides reading space for 70 students and houses 17,029 books, including 570 reference materials. The library also offers access to 46 academic journals and is registered under the NLIST program, giving users entry to a digital repository with 195,809 e-books and 6,793 e-journals.

Utilizing the KOHA Integrated Library Management System, the library streamlines operations such as member circulation and cataloguing.

Barcode technology enhances the lending and renewal process, ensuring transparency. Facilities include a browsing area with 18 computers, a reprographics center, and a discussion room for group study. The library also hosts programs like book reviews, orientation sessions, and quiz competitions to encourage research and reading.

The Library Advisory Committee, led by the Principal, oversees operations and meets annually to recommend improvements. Open from 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday to Saturday, the library features well-defined areas: reading rooms, circulation desks, reference sections, periodicals, research and career resources, and discussion rooms, ensuring comprehensive support for diverse learning needs.

The college's automated bell and announcement system ensures effective communication, while its comprehensive website and YouTube channel provide ongoing updates and resources. Additionally, a well-

equipped examination cell enhances operational efficiency. A CCTV system with 49 cameras bolsters campus safety. WMO College remains committed to leveraging technology for enriching learning experiences and maintaining a sustainable, innovative educational environment.

WMO College has established a robust system for maintaining and utilizing its physical, academic, and support facilities, including laboratories, libraries, sports complexes, computer labs, and classrooms. Adhering to a well-defined maintenance policy and standard operating procedures (SOPs), the management team, supported by the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA), ensures effective infrastructure upkeep. A Maintenance Committee, led by the Principal, oversees these activities, while a Technical Advisory Committee guides the maintenance of electronic equipment. Daily tasks are managed by the Campus Supervisor, with a Technical Assistant focusing on ICT needs.

General Infrastructure: The Maintenance Committee designates staff roles for specific maintenance tasks, schedules routine inspections, and maintains stock registers with annual verification. The college office updates report registers regularly, and security management is supported by experts.

Classrooms and Seminar Halls: A Facilities Manager coordinates maintenance, with a centralized booking system requiring reservations at least 48 hours in advance.

IT Infrastructure: An IT Maintenance Committee conducts regular audits and provides training on new technologies.

Curriculum Development: Each department creates an action plan at the beginning of the academic year to effectively deliver the curriculum, accompanied by an annual academic calendar. To enhance the curriculum further, certificate courses are also planned. Faculty members on the Board of Studies contribute to the development and restructuring of the syllabus.

Teaching and Learning: Departments integrate ICT-enabled teaching methods and prioritize student-centric approaches whenever feasible. They implement bridge courses, remedial coaching, tutorial systems, and mentoring initiatives. The college also organizes invited talks, seminars, and workshops while establishing clear course outcomes for all programs. Additionally, academic and administrative audits are conducted in each department, and both students and faculty are encouraged to utilize online learning resources.

Examination and Evaluation: Internal examinations are conducted both centrally and at the departmental level. The Continuous Internal

Evaluation (CIE) process includes unit tests, assignments, viva voce, open book tests, and seminars to comprehensively assess student performance.

Research and Development: Students are required to undertake research projects as part of their curriculum in all departments, with three faculty members serving as research guides. Departments collaborate with major research institutions, and in 2019, WMO Arts and Science College was selected as one of 18 colleges across India to receive funding under the UGC's STRIDE project, component-I.

Infrastructure: The college features five well-equipped laboratories, a comprehensive library, and high-speed Wi-Fi connectivity throughout the campus, creating a conducive environment for learning.

The college receives funding from various sources, including the Government, UGC, PTA, and Management. Funds from the government and UGC undergo audits at multiple levels. The first level of auditing is performed by a Chartered Accountant, followed by a second-level audit conducted by the Directorate of Collegiate Education, which verifies all documentation related to the public funds utilized by the college. Additionally, auditors from the Accountant General's office in Kerala conduct periodic reviews of the accounts for government and UGC funds.

The Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) collects contributions from parents, which are used for student welfare and are audited both internally by the college accountant and externally by a Chartered Accountant. Funds received by the Staff Club are also audited internally, with the report presented at the annual general body

meeting.

At the beginning of each academic year, the college prepares a budget, and the accounts for funds received from management are verified by the accounts section. At the end of each financial year, all accounts are audited by a Chartered Accountant, who then prepares the annual financial statements and audit reports.

The college has a student strength of 1817, with 60% girls and 90% from backward communities. 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The institute follows a dual assessment system, with 20% weightage for Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and 80% for the External End Semester Examination (ESE). Both CIA and ESE employ an indirect grading system. The University conducts the summative ESE, awarding final grades after external evaluation. A transparent, efficient mechanism governs the CIA process, aligned with the University's framework and overseen by a college-level committee and coordinator.

For theory courses, test scores account for 40% of internal assessment, while assignments, seminars, and class participation (based on attendance) contribute 20% each. Practical courses allocate 60% to record-keeping and 40% to lab participation. Projects are evaluated on content quality, presentation, conclusion, and research aptitude, while seminars are graded on structure, content, presentation, and interactivity. Students receive additional tests and assignments to help them reach optimal performance.

To maintain transparency, internal assessment scores are displayed on the department notice board, and students review a draft of the internal marks uploaded to the University portal, signing for confirmation. All assessment records are archived in the relevant departments, and students can review their work, seek clarification, and understand their performance evaluation.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

The college has a transparent, decentralized system to handle grievances related to internal assessments, with a two-level approach at the department and college levels. This structure ensures that student concerns are addressed effectively at the grassroots.

At the department level, a grievance committee is chaired by the Head of the Department, with a course teacher, a senior faculty member, and the Association Secretary (an elected student representative) as members. This team addresses complaints initially, providing a quick resolution path. If an issue remains unresolved, students can escalate their concerns to the college-level committee.

The College-Level Committee is chaired by the Principal and includes the student adviser, two senior teachers, two staff council members (one elected), and the College Union Chairperson as the student representative. This committee handles unresolved grievances, ensuring fairness and impartiality in reviewing internal assessment grades.

If students are still unsatisfied with the outcome at the college level, they have the option to appeal to the University Level Grievance Redressal Committee. Academic records, maintained by the course teacher for each student, are available to the grievance redressal committees as needed, ensuring transparency and accountability in the grievance process.

The college has a structured approach to communicate Programme Outcomes (PO) and Course Outcomes (CO) to students and faculty. POs and COs are designed by the respective board of studies, included in the syllabus, and published on the University and College websites for transparency and accessibility. A dedicated monitoring committee, appointed by the college council, oversees the implementation of Outcome-Based Education (OBE) across programs, ensuring all stakeholders are informed.

To emphasize the importance of learning outcomes, discussions are held in meetings with the IQAC, college council, and departments. Each program's syllabus, including its outcomes, is available online and as printed copies in department offices for easy reference and PO and CO are displayed on each department's notice board. During an orientation held at both college and department levels, new students are introduced to their program's outcomes. Additionally, teachers communicate the specific outcomes of each course at the beginning of the term and outline a semester plan with assessment methods to track students' progress toward these outcomes.

A college handbook, provided to all faculty and students, also includes relevant details about the programs and outcomes, reinforcing a shared understanding of academic expectations and learning goals.

Assessment techniques include preparing question banks tailored to different courses, featuring varying difficulty levels and strong discrimination power. Unit tests are administered at the end of each unit to evaluate students' competency as required by the course. Additionally, assignments, seminars, role plays, debates, and other student-centered methods are meticulously designed to gauge the level of attainment for defined outcomes.

The attainment of program outcomes is measured using several metrics: the pass percentage of a program offers insight into the achievement of specified outcomes; student enrollment in higher studies, both domestically and internationally, indicates the effectiveness of the curriculum; and the placement rate in companies and industries reflects students' readiness for the workforce. Furthermore, the number of students who become self-employed or entrepreneurs serves as an additional measure. Student satisfaction surveys conducted by the IQAC further enhance the assessment process, providing valuable feedback for continuous improvement.

WMO Arts and Science College, Muttill, is located on a 14-acre environmentally-friendly campus designed for around 2,000 students. The college provides comprehensive facilities that

support educational, athletic, and recreational activities, including:

- 51 Classrooms with white/green boards, Wi-Fi, LCD projectors, LED TVs, and interactive boards for 11 UG and 8 PG programs.
- Seven Laboratories: Electronics, Physics, Chemistry, Media, and three Computer Labs for hands-on learning.
- An Audiovisual Studio and an e-Content Development Centre to facilitate multimedia learning.
- Two Browsing Centers and a Language Laboratory enhancing language skills and research capabilities.
- Three Seminar Halls equipped with modern ICT capabilities for presentations.
- A well-equipped Library (600 sq. m) featuring stacks, reference areas, and online resources such as INFLIBINET-N LIST, e-journals, e-books, and e-magazines, with remote access facilities.
- Fully Wi-Fi Enabled campus with dual leased lines (BSNL 300 MBPS and Malanad 75 MBPS).
- CCTV Surveillance and a Centralized Announcement System connecting all academic blocks.
- Divyangjan-Friendly Facilities, including separate toilets for boys and girls with a napkin vending machine and incinerator.
- A Learning Management System (Moodle) for academic support, plus access to NPTEL and other online courses.
- Additional facilities include a Counseling Room, Sick Room, Student Well-being Centre, and a Health Gymnasium.
- Separate Parking Facilities, Hostels for Boys and Girls, a Canteen, a Bookstore, Prayer Rooms, and Staff Quarters.
- Infrastructure features ramps for accessibility, an Auto Bell System, a Generator (125 KVA), Rainwater Harvesting, and PABX for communication.

WMO Arts and Science College offers a comprehensive range of outdoor sports facilities, including football, volleyball, shuttle badminton, and cricket. The college features an international standard cricket pitch developed with the Kerala Cricket Association. Football and volleyball teams boast impressive records at the university level. Facilities include a 3484-square-meter football field, a 162-square-meter volleyball court, three standard-size shuttle courts, and a 400-meter athletic track, alongside a well-equipped gymnasium.

Infrastructure details include:

- 400-meter track with a multipurpose playing area
- Sports hostel for men, constructed with UGC support
- Two standard-size volleyball courts
- One standard-size football field
- One standard-size cricket field with a turf pitch

Indoor facilities comprise a well-maintained Yoga and Staff Recreation Centre, with separate centers for girls and boys equipped with chess boards and caroms. The fitness center spans 603 square feet.

The Ibn Khaldun Library serves as the central library and learning resource center of the college, featuring a fully automated system and extensive broadband and Wi-Fi access. Spanning 6,458 square feet, it provides reading space for 70 students and houses 17,029 books, including 570 reference materials. The library also offers access to 46 academic journals and is registered under the NLIST program, giving users entry to a digital repository with 195,809 e-books and 6,793 e-journals.

Utilizing the KOHA Integrated Library Management System, the library streamlines operations such as member circulation and cataloguing. Barcode technology enhances the lending and renewal process, ensuring transparency. Facilities include a browsing area with 18 computers, a reprographics center, and a discussion room for group study. The library also hosts programs like book reviews, orientation sessions, and quiz competitions to encourage research and reading.

The Library Advisory Committee, led by the Principal, oversees operations and meets annually to recommend improvements. Open from 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday to Saturday, the library features well-defined areas: reading rooms, circulation desks, reference sections, periodicals, research and career resources, and discussion rooms, ensuring comprehensive support for diverse learning needs.

Additionally, a well-equipped examination cell enhances operational efficiency. A CCTV system with 49 cameras bolsters campus safety. A Maintenance Committee, led by the Principal, oversees these activities, while a Technical Advisory Committee guides the maintenance of electronic equipment. Curriculum Development: Each department creates an action plan at the beginning of the academic year to effectively deliver the curriculum, accompanied by an annual academic calendar. To enhance the curriculum further, certificate courses are also planned. Faculty members on the Board of Studies contribute to the development and restructuring of the syllabus.

Teaching and Learning: Departments integrate ICT-enabled teaching methods and prioritize student-centric approaches whenever feasible. They implement bridge courses, remedial coaching, tutorial systems, and mentoring initiatives. The college also

organizes invited talks, seminars, and workshops while establishing clear course outcomes for all programs. Additionally, academic and administrative audits are conducted in each department, and both students and faculty are encouraged to utilize online learning resources.

Examination and Evaluation: Internal examinations are conducted both centrally and at the departmental level. The Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) process includes unit tests, assignments, viva voce, open book tests, and seminars to comprehensively assess student performance.

Research and Development: Students are required to undertake research projects as part of their curriculum in all departments, with three faculty members serving as research guides. Departments collaborate with major research institutions, and in 2019, WMO Arts and Science College was selected as one of 18 colleges across India to receive funding under the UGC's STRIDE project, component-I.

Infrastructure: The college features five well-equipped laboratories, a comprehensive library, and high-speed Wi-Fi connectivity throughout the campus, creating a conducive environment for learning.

The college receives funding from various sources, including the Government, UGC, PTA, and Management. Funds from the government and UGC undergo audits at multiple levels. The first level of auditing is performed by a Chartered Accountant, followed by a second-level audit conducted by the Directorate of Collegiate Education, which verifies all documentation related to the public funds utilized by the college. Additionally, auditors from the Accountant General's office in Kerala conduct periodic reviews of the accounts for government and UGC funds.

The Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) collects contributions from parents, which are used for student welfare and are audited both internally by the college accountant and externally by a Chartered Accountant. Funds received by the Staff Club are also audited internally, with the report presented at the annual general body meeting.

At the beginning of each academic year, the college prepares a budget, and the accounts for funds received from management are verified by the accounts section. At the end of each financial year, all accounts are audited by a Chartered Accountant, who then prepares the annual financial statements and audit reports.

across the campus for segregating degradable and non-degradable waste. Incinerators in common restrooms and hostels ensure the safe disposal of sanitary products.

Green Protocol and Event Management Strict adherence to the Green Protocol minimizes reliance on single-use items. Non-disposable plates and glasses are utilized during events, significantly reducing plastic waste. The use of flex boards and banners is prohibited, with students encouraged to use eco-friendly alternatives like paper or cloth.

Wastewater Management Water from the canteen and handwashing stations is funneled into a common underground pit for natural filtration, aiding water conservation.
